

Robin Browning Conductor of Essex Youth Orchestra

Robin Browning is an established conductor and renowned conducting teacher. Praised as an "expert musician & conductor" by Sir Charles Mackerras, Robin is a passionate advocate for the power of music to change lives. Striving for a flexible approach in all aspects of his work - conducting, music education and conductor training - he always aims to inspire and unite through communication and barrierbreaking.

Robin is currently Principal Conductor and Music Director with de Havilland Philharmonic, Petersfield Orchestra, Havant Chamber Orchestra and Essex Youth Orchestra.

He is the Artistic Director of SÓN Orchestra, a flexible, professional UK-based ensemble, appointed as Orchestra in Association at Southampton's Turner Sims for three seasons between 2017 and 2020. With SÓN, Robin instigated a highly successful series of Unwrapped events, sharing the stage with David Owen Norris and John Suchet to explore and 'unwrap' composers including Beethoven, Copland, Elgar

and Vaughan Williams. A
Beethoven concerto cycle
with John Lill culminated in
the Emperor in 2019, and
Max Richter's Four Seasons
Recomposed (with soloist
Thomas Gould) featured in the
same year.

Robin also appears as a regular guest conductor, including in recent seasons with Milton Keynes City Orchestra, Oxford University Orchestra, Cambridge University Chamber Orchestra, and Ernest Read Symphony Orchestra in London. Since

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making his debut with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra at the Barbican Hall, Robin has conducted (amongst others) the Hallé, English Northern Philharmonia, Northern Sinfonia, Danish Radio Symphony Orchestra, and Estonian National Youth Orchestra

Driven by a deep belief in music education, Robin spearheads multiple outreach and community projects with SÓN Orchestra musicians. Highlights include **SÓNic** Interventions - a fourconcert series curated by Robin to celebrate the opening of Southampton's new John Hansard Gallery, featuring artwork by Gerhard Richter, with works chosen to explore space, minimalism and randomness: Tales of a Young Person's Orchestra - with SoCo Music Project, based around Beethoven's **Pastoral** Symphony in three Hampshire SEND schools; and two electronic waste projects, TRACE-E - the first involving 100 schoolchildren performing new pieces

about environment and the circular economy, the second featuring Robin as Musician-in-Residence composing and performing new works based on smartphone sounds.

An Album from this most recent project – The TRACE-E EP – can be found on Robin's Soundcloud page, and various associated films can be viewed on his YouTube channel.

Robin enjoys a highly successful collaboration with artist and presenter James Mayhew, since their earliest performances together on stage with de Havilland Philharmonic over 15 years ago. In that time, in more than 50 concerts together, they have impacted and inspired the lives of youngsters through music, art and story-telling.

He has also worked with some of the world's greatest soloists, including violinists Savitri Grier, Jennifer Pike and Jack Liebeck; violists Laurence Power and Timothy Ridout; cellists Raphael Wallfisch and Guy Johnston; guitarist Craig Ogden; and upcoming horn players Annemarie Federle and Ben Goldscheider.

In addition to his conducting, arts-leadership and guest-conducting work, Robin enjoys a teaching career which has spanned almost three decades, inspiring countless young musicians to take up the baton. For over 20

years he held the position of conducting specialist teacher at University of Southampton, and has given workshops and masterclasses around the UK, including at Trinity Laban Conservatoire, University of Hertfordshire and at Winchester College. He now works exclusively with the conductors in the British Army, where he has been Conducting Professor since 2022.

Robin initially studied on an Italian Government Scholarship at **Accademia Chigiana**, Siena, with Myung-Whun Chung and the legendary Ilya Musin. He furthered his training in the **USA** with Benjamin Zander and movement specialist Joseph Gifford. Robin was mentored for many years by Sir Charles Mackerras. deepened his technical conducting studies with Sian Edwards, and participated in masterclasses with Neeme Järvi and Paavo Järvi at the **Oistrakh Festival** in Pärnu, Estonia. He went on to assist Paavo Järvi on his Beethoven cycle with Deutsche Kammerphilharmie,



and Nielsen Symphonies project with the Philharmonia Orchestra. Robin has also served as assistant conductor to Sakari Oramo on the UK premiere of Esa-Pekka Salonen's Violin Concerto with the BBC Symphony Orchestra and Leila Josefowicz, and Sian Edwards in works by Maxwell Davies with London Sinfonietta at the BBC Proms.

Having benefited from years of intense training with such esteemed teachers, Robin is passionate about passing on his knowledge and experience to the next generation of musicians, infusing his pedagogy with a combination of technical rigour and expressive power. His students can be found today on the podiums of orchestras and bands across the UK and Europe.

Equally at home in the recording studio as much as the concert hall, Robin has recorded four albums for commercial release,

including selected world premiere performances with various ensembles, featuring composers such as Raymond Warren, John Hopkins and Howard Burrell. All are available on Spotify, Apple Music, Amazon and other streaming platforms.

Robin's TRACE-E Musician-in-Residence project culminated in a recent album release, now available on Soundcloud, recorded with SÓN Orchestra musicians combined with electronic samples, Ableton Live and spoken word.



Jane Hammond EYO Assistant Conductor


Jane Hammond is a first-year undergraduate music student at Sidney Sussex College, Cambridge University. She is a member of the Cambridge University Orchestra which has already involved concerts at West Road Concert Hall and King's College Chapel, and were conducted by Alice Farnham, Jac van Steen, Martyn Brabbins, and Bertie Baigent. She is also a clarinettist in the Cambridge New Music Ensemble, Cambridge Gilbert & Sullivan Society, for the Footlights, as well as many other projects.

Prior to university, she attended the Royal College of Music Junior Department which included playing principal clarinet in the Symphony Orchestra for concerts in Amaryllis Fleming Concert Hall and the Cadogan Hall, as well as playing bass clarinet in the chamber orchestra for Schoenberg's Chamber Symphony No 1.

Whilst at RCMJD, Jane played Brahms' Clarinet Quintet at the Wigmore Hall as the prize for runner-up in the chamber music competition which is one of her proudest moments. Jane was also a clarinettist in the National Youth Orchestra for 2023, playing the complete Firebird Ballet which was conducted by Andrew Gourlay at the Royal Festival Hall and Saffron Hall which was recorded for BBC Radio 3. 2023 was a busy year for Jane for exams as she achieved distinction in her DipABRSM Diploma in Clarinet, as well as a pass in her AMusTCL Theory diploma and a merit for her ARSM Piano diploma. In 2022, Jane performed the Krommer Clarinet Concerto with the St Botolph's Music Society Orchestra which was her first concerto with orchestra.

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Jane is also a proud member of Essex Music Service. having played in Essex Youth Orchestra and Essex Youth **Symphonic Wind Orchestra** as a clarinettist since 2019. This year, Jane is delighted to be acting as an Associate Conductor for Essex Youth Orchestra under Robin Browning, having already conducted the orchestra on tour in the Netherlands and Belgium for Pirates of the Caribbean, as well as more recently conducting the orchestra for Danzon No. 2 by Marquez in Chelmsford Cathedral at Christmas.





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Isabella Patrick

Leader of Essex Youth Orchestra

Isabella started learning the violin at the age of 7, and is currently under the tutelage of Dominic Moore, with whom she is also learning the viola. She also learns piano with Christopher Weston, and organ with Jonathan Turner. As well as being a multiinstrumentalist and mezzosoprano, Isabella also has a passion for choral music, as a composer and conductor, and most recently had a piece premiered by the Waltham Singers. She participates in the music at Brentwood Cathedral. Isabella is also learning choral conducting and, one day, hopes to direct a top


choir. Isabella plays in various ensembles and orchestras and leads the New Hall School Symphony Orchestra, Titan Sinfonia and the Essex Youth Orchestra. This year, she also joined the Essex Music Service's String Octet. Last year, Isabella competed in the final of the prestigious Pro Corda National Chamber Music Competition with the New Hall Piano Quartet. Alongside music, Isabella enjoys playing tennis and running. As a keen linguist, Isabella is studying Latin and Ancient Greek.

In this concert, Isabella's piece for String Octet will be premiered:

'Waves' for String Octet captures the journey of a wave: its ebbs and flows, its growth, fast modulation, and eventual return to its original stillness. On a more emotional level, this wave becomes a metaphor for human experience: the transition from serenity to turbulence, before finding equilibrium once again.









Matthew Andrews EYPO Conductor

Matthew Andrews is a graduate of London's Guildhall School of Music & Drama, where he chaired the Contemporary Music Society and studied composition (Dr Robert Saxton), piano (Susan Alexander Max) and conducting technique (Alan Hazeldine). He received further tuition with Simon Bainbridge, Hans Werner Henze and conductors Christopher Adey and Peter Stark.

In demand as an orchestral trainer, Matt is a visiting conductor to the Guildhall School of Music (Junior Dept.), Wells Cathedral School Symphony Orchestra and Essex Young People's Orchestra. He directs many courses and workshops, most recently with Norfolk County Youth Orchestra.

His début with Norwich Philharmonic Orchestra conducting Mahler's Resurrection Symphony led to Matt's immediate appointment as Principal Conductor, a post he also holds with the Sudbury Symphony Orchestra. He is also a regular guest conductor with the Academy of St Thomas and has been de facto Artistic Director of the McKinsey Music Festival at the Alpine University in Kitzbühel since its inception eleven years ago.

Matt is sought after for his realisations of modern music and leading complex musical projects, including the première of Neil Yates's Surroundings for antiphonal Big Band (Manchester Jazz

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Festival), the War Requiem for the Britten Centenary and will perform Mahler's 'Symphony of a Thousand' for the Norfolk & Norwich Festival 2016.

He has also conducted the Northern Sinfonia, Amadeus Orchestra, Essex Youth Orchestra, North London Chorus (Artistic Director 2000-02) and Opera Lab, and taught orchestral conducting technique at the Guildhall School of Music. Matt was assistant to composer Geoffrey Burgon, recording with the Academy of St Martin in the Fields, and the BAFTA awardwinning soundtrack Longitude with the Philharmonia Orchestra.



Atharv Gupta EYPO Assistant Conductor

Aged 15, Atharv is a young conductor, composer, trombonist and pianist. His musical journey began at age 5 in Redbridge's Young Music Makers program, but it was during lockdown at age 10 that he discovered his passion for composition and classical music, which have since become an integral part of his life.

In 2021, Atharv joined Essex Music Service, becoming part of the Essex Youth Jazz Orchestra, Youth Brass Ensemble, Youth Symphonic Wind Orchestra and Young Person's Orchestra. In the following year, he joined the Essex Youth Orchestra where he enjoys playing Bass Trombone. Additionally, he attends Trinity Laban Junior Department on Saturdays, learning Conducting and Composition with Darren Bloom and Trombone with Andrew Connington.

A major highlight of Atharv's musical life came last year when he was selected as one of the winners of the BBC Young Composer Award which has led to him taking part in a yearlong tailored development programme to work with a mentor composer on a piece that will be premiered by the BBC Concert Orchestra at the BBC Proms this summer. This





year, Atharv was chosen as one of the ORA Singers Young Composers 2024, which will result in him taking part in a mentorship programme with a professional composer and ORA Singers, culminating in a live performance and recording of a choral work he will write at Worcester Cathedral this summer.

Atharv made his conducting debut last summer when he had the opportunity to take part in a conducting masterclass with Robin Browning and conduct the Essex Young Person's Orchestra. Following on from the masterclass, Atharv was offered the position of the EYPO's apprentice conductor where he conducts them under the guidance of Matthew Andrews and is very grateful for the opportunity to be able

to work with such a talented group of young musicians.

Outside of music, Atharv debates and quizzes for his school and plays Table Tennis for Chelmsford Table Tennis Club. He is also very passionate about physics and wants to become either a quantum physicist or a composer/conductor.





Larry Au Leader of Essex Young People's Orchestra

Larry began his violin studies at the age of two under the guidance of Pro Takoko Nishizaki. He has been actively involved in orchestras since primary school, where he quickly rose to become the first violinist. Larry's dedication and skill have earned him numerous gold medals in inter-school competitions, showcasing his passion and talent for music. 16

Essex Youth Orchestra (EYO) is the flagship ensemble for Essex Music Service, beginning in 1957. Over the years we have seen many of its players from all over Essex go on to become professionals in the music industry, benefitting from the high standard and opportunities gained from their experience. The orchestra play a wide range of classical styles and composers, performing at many different venues across Essex including Saffron Hall and Chelmsford Cathedral. The take part in residential courses and go on tour to Europe bi-annually, having visited countries such as Germany, Poland, Czech Republic, Budapest and many more.

Players of **Grade 7** standard on **Woodwind**, **Strings**, **Brass** and **Percussion** from across Essex are invited to attend an **annual audition workshop** where they can learn audition tips from professional musicians and perform their prepared audition piece.

Essex Youth Orchestra String Octet is formed by experienced players from Essex Youth Orchestra. Led by Maximilian Pietrzak, they perform at prestigious events for Essex County Council developing their own musicianship and chamber music skill under the expect coaching of John Chillingworth, formally with the Guadagnini String Quartet and principal cellist with English National Opera.

In March 2023, they performed for King Charles III and his Queen Consort at their visit to Colchester to celebrate the town being awarded city status.

The Octet are Maximilian Pietrzak, Isabella Patrick, Annabelle Gray, Zakkai Amachree, Charlie Newman, Euan Bookless, Jonathan Best and Donall Childs. Essex Young People's Orchestra is the training orchestra for Essex Youth Orchestra. This music group aims to develop the skills necessary to become an experienced orchestral player.

EYPO come together to rehearse a wide range of classical styles and composers and perform at many different venues across Essex. Players of Grade 4 standard and above are invited to participate.


Players meet for four short courses culminating with performances across Essex.
